If you've travelled north of Major Mackenzie Drive on Ninth Line lately you probably noticed the large white tent-like building on the west side of Ninth Line. The building is part of the brand new East Markham Works Yard.

This is very good news for residents in Ward 5 and other areas of east Markham as we can expect improved snow clearing response times during winter snow events. Previously snow removal vehicles had to travel a long distance from the works yard near Woodbine and 14th Avenue to refill their supply of salt and sand.

The new facility will not only reduce response times, but the new state-of-the-art bulding will provide a lot more capacity for salt storage, allowing the City to purchase larger amounts when prices are lower, and ensure we don't run short.

In addition, the new site will provide accessible, well-managed snow storage, and provide space for essential contractor equipment.

Markham is growing rapidly, and this facility will help ensure we're prepared to address new needs and improve service delivery.
