Blodwen Davies Park (Upper Greensborough Park) is anticipated to be open in July 2022 and will include tennis courts, shade structure, playground, passive lawn area, site furniture, pathways, and plantings. Another great recreation space.

The Grand Cornell basketball court has been in a holding pattern but I am happy to report our new Park Renaissance Planner should have design plans ready for tender for late summer which means playing will begin next spring.
